 The Policy follows a three prong approach to Stigma reduction.
Empowerment, Education and Enabling Environment

Content of the Policy

- FBOs and Media

Policy Content continued

- Human Rights defended in the Policy:
- Non discrimination
- Health
- Equality between men and women
- Children
- Privacy
- Education and information

Policy Content continued

- Work
- Marry and create a family
- Social Security assistance and welfare
- Liberty
- Freedom of movement

Policy to law

- The Policy suggests that governments should establish laws to criminalize discrimination based on:
- Sex, gender, place of origin, political opinions, colour or creed, sexual orientation, age, disability, HIV or other health status, religion, pregnancy or conscience sex work

The Proposed Law

The Law is created to protect persons against discrimination, harassment, victimization and vilification on the grounds of HIV status, sexual orientation, lawful sexual activity, status as an orphan, disability and gender

The proposal also includes:

- Establishment of an antidiscrimination tribunal
- Functions of the tribunal to be hearing and determination of discrimination complaints
- Independence, composition and working protocols of the tribunal
